Historic Stallions to Know

- 1. Roman's Straw Man, one of the finest-ever Appaloosa stallions, stood for what may have been a record \$10,000 stud fee in the 1980s. His 438 foals produced between 1975 and 1991 earned him six-time Get of Sire National or World Champion.
- Although uncommon, famous Appaloosa stallions have sired between 200 and 500 babies. Goer was a distinct exception. His 723 registered foals produced between 1976 and 1995 may well have been an all-time Appaloosa record.
- 3. The legendary stallion Joker B. was foaled in Colorado in 1941 but not registered until 1946 by his then owner from Barstow, Calif. Since the preferred name Joker was already taken, the letter B. was added to complete the registration. It represented his owner's last name, Lee Berry. Photo 1 →
- 4. Stories about the nearly immortal Mansfield's Comanche persist in saying he was never ridden, but they are wrong. The facts are clear, and from Jack Mansfield himself, based on a 1967 interview: "Mr. Mansfield told us it had been published that Mansfield's Comanche had never been broke and ridden. This is incorrect. Joe Wheeler, who worked for Mr. Mansfield for over 25 years, broke and used him on the ranch." Photo 2 ⇒
- Chief of Fourmile was the epitome of Appaloosa versatility. While competing in the mid-1950s, his 15 National and World titles included championships in halter, trail, Nez Perce Stakes, English pleasure, rope race and three different racing distances, all topped off by winning National Champion Performance Horse in 1955, 1956 and 1958. Photo 3 →
- 6. The Shatka Bear-Step Katouche was one of the ApHC's most sought-after and coveted awards. Beginning in 1953 and ending in 1972, this unique award was presented to each year's National Champion 2-year-old colt. The first winner, American Eagle, owned by the legendary Rhoma Cox of Riverside, Calif., was the first and for many years the only 2-year-old to win the Katouche and National Grand Champion Stallion in the same year.
- 7. Run For Blue, one of Roman's Straw Man's better sons, was a Register of Merit, Medallion winner and many times halter and All-Around Performance Horse champion owned by the famous Bar DK Appaloosa Ranch, Pampas, Texas. The stallion was once entered in and won a Fort Worth, Texas, TV program's contest and was named Texas All-Breed Show Horse of the Year for 1983.
- 8. Cojo Rojo was the product of Rancho El Cojo, one of California's oldest Appaloosa ranches. The colorful stallion became a legend by first starring with Marlon Brando in the famous Hollywood film "The Appaloosa" and then winning the American Humane Association's Patsy Award as top animal actor of the year for 1966.
- 9. Much has been written about High Sign and his trainer, Jack Hennig. Together, they won over 54 National and World titles. One little-known fact stands as testimony to their successes in open National Reining Horse Association competition. Their first NRHA paycheck was earned in 1974, and their last in August 1992, only a few months before High Sign died of a ruptured intestine in October.
- 10. The Appaloosa breed has produced a long list of unsung legends. Quanah is one of them. Foaled in 1947, he was relatively unknown until he was sold in 1958 to his final home, C.D. Leon's world-famous Pendaries Ranch in the foothills of New Mexico's Sangre de Cristo mountains. With only three months of training on cattle, he placed second in cutting at the 1959 ApHC National in California. Following more training, he achieved wins in open cuttings in three Texas cities, Durant, Okla., and Albuquerque, N.M., where he was the only Appaloosa competing. Leon later said, "he was a champion at halter, reining and cutting who passes natural cow sense on to his colts." Photo 4 →

Appaloosa History Quiz: LEGENDARY STALLIONS

Before you meet today's top stallions listed in the 2026 Stallion Directory, test your knowledge of the legends. Long before the stallions featured in this directory were foaled, a handful of extraordinary Appaloosa sires stood out in the show ring, on the ranch and in the breeding shed. Whether you're new to the Appaloosa Horse Club (ApHC) or have decades of experience, learning about these foundation stallions helps you better understand the strengths behind the pedigrees you see today.

Think you know your Appaloosa history?

Questions

Q1

Foaled in 1963 on one of the Appaloosa world's greatest ranches, this stallion's sire got a new name in 1961 after originally being registered as Johnnie Morton W. With part of that new name in his, "Baby" became what his later Texas trainer, Harry Reed, described as a "legend in his own time." Who was this famous stallion, a winner in multiple performance classes, who never lost a Get Of Sire class at major Fat Stock Shows, and sired an opera star who appeared on stage at the historic Pittsburgh Opera Hall?

Q2

Described by George Hatley as "A Most Unusual Appaloosa" and by many others as one of the Appaloosa breed's all-time great performance horses, this Idaho stallion was bred, owned and shown by Orvil Sears. Foaled in 1942 but unregistered until 1949, he won nearly every open all-breed race and match races against Quarter Horses and Thoroughbreds. Then, between races, he was shown in youth and ladies' pleasure classes. Who was this great stallion, whose career in the 1950s produced 21 National Champion titles, including halter, racing, calf roping, cutting and stock horse?

Q3

Appaloosa stallions can become legendary in sometimes very unique ways. Foaled in Oregon in 1960, Circle Seven X Show Boy, his original registration name before being changed, was clearly one of them. With a new name, he competed against the best all-breed jumping horses in the Western United States, winning major jumping sweepstakes events, especially in California and Arizona. Eventually owned and campaigned by Robert Heilman's Sutter Bar R Ranch of Glass Valley, Calif., he was widely recognized as an ambassador for the breed and one of, if not the greatest, Appaloosa jumping horses through the late 1960s. Who was this famous stallion, perhaps widely unknown in most Appaloosa circles until now?

Q4

The year 1971 was history-making for the Appaloosa breed, the Appaloosa cutting horse industry, the

National Cutting Horse Association (NCHA) and especially an already highly successful Appaloosa cutting horse stallion. Trained and shown by legendary NCHA exhibitor Sam Wilson, this son of Rustler Bill set numerous firsts after competing in 42 NCHA championship shows during the 1971 season. Who was this now-legendary stallion, whose firsts included the first time in NCHA Top Ten history that a non-Quarter Horse, and an Appaloosa to boot, had finished the season ranked in the Top Five? He finished fourth.

Q5

Foaled in 1975, this stallion compiled a modest open show and ApHC record after being purchased as a yearling by eventual world-renowned horseman and clinician John Lyons. Despite producing only 21 foals, he was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1997, based exclusively on his 20 years of work as Lyons' partner during hundreds of worldwide training and handling clinics and symposiums. Who was this stallion who helped expose the qualities of the Appaloosa to thousands of people and whose name is derived from two Hall of Famers in his pedigree?

Q6

Throughout Appaloosa history, breeders have produced many stallions worthy of the title "Legendary." This 1958 stallion from Montana was one of the best. Trained and shown for five years by the legendary Bob Hankla, the two won over 250 National, World and Regional Championships in halter and performance. Sold to R.H. Dunham's famous Sunset Arena after Hankla's death in 1965, the stallion continued producing more of his 451 total foals, whose halter and performance achievements are matched by only a few stallions before or since. Who was this legend of legends?

Q7

Foaled in 1953, this stallion was the product of two legends, his breeder Claude Thompson and sire Red Eagle. After winning National Grand Champion Stallion in 1956, he was sold in 1960 to another legend, the Californian Bob Hawkins. The stallion's next five owners, including the famous Terlingua syndicate and ending with his sale in 1973 to Connecticut's Old Spring Farm, finalized his legendary status. Named after a bird who likes to

strut and seem above it all, who was this Appaloosa whose babies produced multiple State, Regional, World and National Champions?

Q8

Who remembers the Colorado-bred stallion Dial Bright Three? He became famous after being purchased by his fourth and final owner for \$20,000 when he was only a long yearling. That owner, who built the world-famous Silver State Appaloosa Ranch in Nevada, became convinced that the colt's original registration name needed changing. With a new name representing the model name of an RV, this stallion sired what became known as a dynasty of halter and performance horse champions. Who was this stallion and his equally legendary owner?


Q9

His is quite a story: how a 2-year-old leopard Appaloosa stallion with an unknown pedigree born in the "Land of the Gauchos" was imported to the U.S. in 1962 along with 40 leopard mares and became one of the best reining, roping and team tying horses in the mid to late 1960s. Who was this famous Appaloosa, imported from Argentina and registered by Louisiana's Ben Burnside, eventually trained and shown by legends Billy Allen and Shorty Russell and later founded South Dakota's famous Oxburn line of championship halter and performance horses?

Q10

Thanks to the historical research and writings by Gene Carr, Cecil Dobbin, Frank Holmes, Dewey Norrell, Chuck Schlegel, Roger Klamfoth and indirectly Robert Denhardt, we know that this supremely legendary stallion was the cornerstone of all the Coke Roberds Appaloosas. Beyond Coke, he was also the primary source of color for many of the early Appaloosas bred, raised and sold by Marshall and Mavis Peavy. Who was this stallion who lived long before the existing breed registries, yet whose name would appear in the extended pedigrees of some of today's Appaloosas?





Cow Horse Comeback

Fueled by stallion incentives, passionate breeders and soaring payouts, the working cow horse classes are charging back into the spotlight at the 2025 World Championship Appaloosa Show.

Whether it's chasing rank cows down the fence or circling them up to cap off a fast-paced run, there's nothing quite like the working cow horse discipline. But for years, the exciting cow horse classes had far fewer participants than many other offerings at the World Championship Appaloosa Show. Thanks to passionate breeders and members of the Appaloosa Horse Club (ApHC), the cow horse is making a big comeback at the 2025 World Show.

"It's going to be a bright spot in the ever-changing and ever-evolving industry," said Melissa Street, show coordinator at ApHC. "I am constantly amazed and energized by the dedication of the members to the breed. They have been able to make all of the opportunities for other members and exhibitors come together for the 2025 World Show."

From stallion incentives to payouts for non-pros, the money available to cow horse riders keeps growing each year. More than \$30,000 is available at this year's event to junior working cow horses alone. Breeders are creating programs not to grow their own finances, but because they're excited about the progeny their horses are producing and hope to increase interest in the Western performance sports.

"I think overall in the equine industry, there is more of an interest and more participation related to anything with a cow," Street said. "It has made its way through all the breeds, and Appaloosa is lucky

enough to have several breeders who can bring those opportunities to our members. Now, their contributions can highlight the riders who already were involved and help motivate new owners."

Something New

The influx of money in the working cow horse classes is led by Liz Kincaid, owner of T.O.P.

Appaloosas in Bridgeport, Texas. Though she isn't a cow horse rider herself, Kincaid supports the class.

While at a past World Show, she realized there was a need for incentives in the discipline. She created A Spotty Working Cow Horse Stallion Service Auction and a working cow horse incentive program, the latter of which she named after her four-time World Champion cutting horse, Gay Bars Silver (Gay Bars Jess x Silver Roxie x The Poka Man).

"I was sitting in the working cow horse watching it, and it was dismal," Kincaid said. "I thought, 'This isn't right. Those people have never had any incentives.' I have supported the Appaloosa Reining Horse Association and the Appaloosa Cutting Horse Association, so I thought, 'You know what? I'm just going to go ahead and call it the Gay Bars Silver Working Cow Horse Incentive and see what happens.' And wow, the money that has popped up from our stallion auction, and people from all over the United States and Canada are excited and wanting to bring their horses again to this little junior working cow horse class."

Gay Bars Silver, an Appaloosa Cutting Horse Association and ApHC Halls of Fame-inducted stallion, was bred by Kincaid herself and, with limited showing, received three bronze medallions and his Register of Merit in cutting.

Big Payouts

Cow horse isn't the only discipline that's seen an influx in purse money in the last few years. ApHC Corporate Sponsor Steinert Ranch returns to sponsor the 2025 roping at the World Show, and the Appaloosa Reining Horse Association, which added new classes to this year's World Championship Appaloosa Show, promises a payout of more than \$30,000. New for 2025 is the Spotted Cow Horse Derby, offering more than \$20,000 in cash and prizes. Between the cutting, reining, roping and cow horse, the World Show cow events are slated to pay out more than \$100,000.

"He was a come-out-of-nowhere, little cutting horse," Kincaid said. "People actually encouraged me to get him in the cuttings because they thought, well, that's added money for them. But it turned out he beat everybody. So, I just kept on cutting with him, and then he went on to become a really great sire."

"I hope it ramps up cow horse in the Appaloosas even more," said Rylee Reiter-Walterscheid. "I want these Apps to get the chance they deserve."

The stallion passed on many things to his offspring, but perhaps his most significant legacy so far is his versatility. His progeny have been successful in halter, English, hunter in-hand, reining, cutting and roping, to name a few. The only class Kincaid could recall that none of his babies had won—yet—was the working cow horse, though she hopes to see that change soon, thanks to the incentive.

To participate in the incentive, there's no need to pay membership fees or added cattle charges. Instead, stallions must be listed in the A Spotty Working Cow Horse Stallion Service Auction, even if the breeding doesn't sell. Their 3-year-old offspring are then eligible to ride for free in the incentive until 2028, which is the first year the offspring resulting from the stallion auction will hit the show pen.

"In 2028, those foals from the auction will ride free of charge in the Gay Bars Silver incentive," Kincaid said. "Then, the brothers and sisters by that same stallion can ride for a minimal fee. Any nominated horses by stallions not in the auction are welcome, too, but will have to pay a rather large fee to ride in the incentive."

In 2024, its first year, Kincaid's stallion auction raised \$11,000, paying out \$6,600 to first place in the Junior Cow Horse incentive and \$4,400 to reserve. Both teams—Brady Jensen and Cold Shot (Stevie Rey Von x What Ya Gonna Do x High Sign Nugget), a stallion owned by Jim Dobler, as well as Clint Kowalski and his mare Ima One Gun Gal (Yor The One x Ima No Guns Gal x No Guns In The Bar)—traveled to the World Show all the way from Canada thanks to the opportunity to run for such high paychecks.

The 2025 World Championship Appaloosa Show will pay out even more at \$18,000, using the National Reined Cow Horse Association (NRCHA) payout schedule. Kincaid hopes to see the money continue increasing each year as more stallions join. It pays



to list stallions in the auction, she added. The sire of the winning offspring in the Junior Working Cow Horse Gay Bars Silver incentive will receive \$1,000 of the payout, plus a full-page color ad in the Appaloosa Journal announcing the winner and their sire.

"We try to do things for the stallion owners as well as the entries," Kincaid said. "It's not going to cost either the stallion owner or entry extra to run for the incentive money. All they have to do is follow ApHC rules. So, you can come to the show, follow the ApHC rules, and if the stallion of the 3-year-old is in our auction, you qualify for the money."

Kincaid is working on gathering more stallions for this year's stallion service auction. Last year, 53 stallions were listed, including barrel racers, cutters, ropers, reiners, Arabians and Appaloosas with running bloodlines. Some highlights included Chicks Dig It, Haidas Slik Willie, KJ Up In Smoke, Quarter Horse stallion Sannman, Some Kinda Shine, Yor The One and Gay Bars Silver himself. Bidders have the opportunity to get a deal on these stallions and more, with bidding starting at 50% of the advertised stud fee.

Thanks to Kincaid's idea, more and more breeders and owners have continued to contribute money to the cow horse. It's not something Kincaid ever expected to be involved in, but she's excited to see where it goes and grateful to honor Gay Bars Silver in the process.

"I can't believe I did this, but I want to go with it and grow it. I want to see \$20,000 to \$25,000 paid out a year. That's my goal," Kincaid said.

Future Goals

Kincaid's successful Gay Bars Silver incentive has many other stallion owners thinking about what they can do to promote the cow horse and their own stallion's offspring. One such breeder, Theron McCammond, who sits on the ApHC Board of Directors for Territory V, recently created a new program for his stallion, KJ Up In Smoke (KJ Sign Of Smoke x KJ Dust N Dawn x OK Appollo), or "Steve."

Called the Cash In With Steve Working Cow Horse Incentive, the program is open to foals by Steve who were born this year or later. Starting in 2028, if any of those babies wins the 3-year-old incentive Kincaid built, McCammond will write them a check for \$5,000.

"That's how much I think of my program," McCammond said. "I've always tried to put some kind of an incentive on Steve's babies. When Liz said she wanted to do the deal she was doing, I was like, absolutely, I want in with it. Me, as an Appaloosa breeder, I don't breed many horses, but my goal is to breed the best."

For himself, McCammond only breeds a small handful of foals each year, focusing on buying the best mares he can find to cross with Steve. He also stands Steve to a select few, high-quality mares. In return, Steve passes on his good mind, athletic talent and color, which is the icing on the cake.

"There have only been four to hit the show pen because I bred one the first year, and the second year, I only bred two mares," McCammond said. "Three of them are money earners. His oldest daughter, High Sign Hollywood, was the first one to show, and she's a money earner in the ranch horse futurity along with Hollies High Sign. And then another one is a money earner in the NRCHA, and the fourth one won a world championship in halter."

Cash In With Steve isn't the only incentive McCammond is promoting. He recently purchased Reminic In Spots (Reminic Ringo x Dixie Sundown x Flashy Chips Jack), one of very few purebred Quarter Horses that carries the leopard complex gene. Now, all eligible daughters of Steve will receive one free future breeding to Reminic In Spots, with the goal of producing even more horses stacked with cow sense in and out of the arena.

McCammond hopes by promoting his stallions through the Gay Bars Silver incentive and his own programs, he can help draw more horses to the World Show that might never have attended otherwise.

"We're in the third year, and we're pushing \$20,000 in payout already," McCammond said. "It's unbelievable."

Unique Show of Support

When Rylee Reiter-Walterscheid and her mom, Mistee Reiter, heard about the Gay Bars Silver incentive, they knew they wanted to be involved. The duo manages Wapz Navajo Danczer (Wapuzzan x BPR Navajo Katinkaty x Regal Tie Dyed), the cornerstone of Reiter Farms' breeding program in Gainesville, Texas. Despite only pasture-breeding a handful of mares each year, the stallion made headlines in 2022 as a freshman sire thanks to his son, four-time World champion RF Wapz Smart Move (out of Wendy Darling x Ima Smart Move), and continues to pass along traits that make for successful Western performance horses.

However, since Reiter Farms doesn't stand Wapz Navajo Danczer to the public, it didn't make sense for them to add him to the A Spotty Working Cow Horse Stallion Service Auction. Reiter-Walterscheid and Reiter came up with a unique solution to pay it forward to the stallion's offspring.

"We wanted to do something for him and for the people who have already bought his offspring, and

so we came to the conclusion that we're going to pay his sons and daughters in and give our customers a shot that way," Reiter-Walterscheid said.

Reiter Farms will pay the Gay Bars Silver incentive nomination fees for any 3-year-old by Wapz Navajo Danczer who is competing in the 2025 World Championship Appaloosa Show, and they plan to offer the same for next year's event. Additionally, they enrolled RF Wapz Smart Move in the stallion service auction to support the incentive program and help it succeed.

"I hope it ramps up cow horse in the Appaloosas even more," Reiter-Walterscheid said. "I think that we're really on a good track right now. I'm just so glad that they started this all up and got this rolling. Hopefully, it will bring bigger cow horse trainers to the Apps. That would be really awesome to see. I want these Apps to get the chance they deserve."

Rising to the Occasion

The Gay Bars Silver incentive and the other programs inspired by it may be in their early days, but they have already sparked a plethora of other opportunities in the cow horse at this year's World Show:

- Frank Marley, owner of legendary stallion Some Kinda Shine (Shine Of A Kind x Precious Lady D x Pok-A-Dan), is offering to pay \$500 to the highest-placing offspring by "Frankie" in the ranch horse, cow horse, roping and games. If a team wins a World Championship, he will double that amount and pay out \$1,000.
- The Appaloosa Ranch Horse Association, on top of several other big ranch horse incentives, is sponsoring the \$5,000 added Spotted Cow Horse Derby, open to 4- and 5-year-old cow horses.
- Teri Nance Clark of Ritero Appaloosa Farm is offering an extra \$500 to the highest-placing senior horse in the non-pro working cow horse.

With almost \$25,000 up for grabs and the promise of even more in the future, there's never been a better time to get involved in the cow horse at the World Championship Appaloosa Show.

"Hopefully this will get people coming to Fort Worth and get our cow horse classes built back up, then allow them to go out to other reined cow horse events," Kincaid said. "It's such a win-win for the working cow horse people, I can't even tell you."

A1

Prince Plaudit was sired by Hank Wiescamp's Red Plaudit. Trained and shown only lightly after being purchased by Carl Miles in 1965, in 1978, he became the first Appaloosa to be awarded the ApHC's

Bronze Production Plaque.

The "opera star" was his 1978 leopard son, Prince Farrell. Prince Plaudit was the only non-Quarter Horse on the top 10 all-time greatest horses list in the September 1984 Horseman magazine.

A2

Apache F-730 was Reserve National Champion Performance Horse in 1949, 1950, 1952, 1954 and 1956, National Champion in 1951 and National Champion Premier Sire of Performance Horses in 1959. His 21 National titles included ladies Western pleasure in 1951 and cutting horse two years in a row in 1950-51.

A3

Sutter's Show Boy produced only 20 foals between 1964 and 1985. One of the best was Show Boy's Sam Star, a 1967 gelding who won California State Champion Jumper in 1976. How famous was his 16-hand sire? He graced the cover of Appaloosa News in November 1967 and April 1972, and the cover of Arizona Highway's tourist magazine in 1968.

Rustler's Risk. Prior to his 1971 NCHA recordsetting season, the stallion's 1969 campaign was near record-setting. Among his many wins: first place in Appaloosa junior cutting in 19 different shows, mostly in Texas, 12 wins in open competition against Quarter Horses, and the first Appaloosa to

win Junior Cutting at all three of the famous "Texas Triangle" Exposition and Fat Stock Shows. Trainer Sam Wilson said it best: "Rustler cut so low that he would actually drag his bit on the ground. He will go down in Appaloosa history as one of the greatest cutting horses that ever lived."

Bright Zip and John Lyons were on the road sometimes for 11 months out of the year. Even more notable, however, is this stallion's condition. Despite losing his eyesight to an allergy in 1995, he continued performing for many years, including without a bridle. This incredible and extraordinary Appaloosa was euthanized in 2003.

Absarokee Sunset. "Absarokee" was a Crow Nation word for crow or big black bird, as well as the Montana mountain region where he was born, also home to the Crow Nation. Some of his more notable wins included twice Grand Champion

Stallion at the huge Denver National Stock Show (1962-63), National and World Champion Pleasure Horse in 1962, Champion Reining Horse, Houston Livestock Show in 1964 and Champion of Champions at the Colorado State Fair 1961-64.

Red Eagle's Peacock. If this stallion was already famous before being sold to Sue and Bob Pabst in 1973, he became a national legend under their ownership.

So strong was his reputation after 1973 that he received fan mail, Christmas cards and visitors from Australia and throughout the U.S., all while servicing 65 mares from 14 states stretching from Texas to Maine. The result? One stallion's influence on the growth of the Appaloosa breed in the Eastern United States. One of his best sons, the 1962 gelding Blue Admiral, may have set an unofficial record by winning a World Championship four years in a row: 1966 Performance Horse, 1967 Trail, 1968 English Pleasure Saddle Seat, and 1969 Reserve Performance Horse.

The Executive, owned by Lew Eklund. This stallion was purchased for the sole purpose of taking Eklund's existing breeding program to a higher level. And did he ever. Shown to championships as a 2-year-old, he was retired to stud, servicing only a few outside mares for the next two years before his book was closed. The many halter and performance champions among the 301 foals born between 1977 and 1997 proved his worth, especially a stallion from that first foal crop. Royal Exhibit became a World and National Champion at Halter, Silver Medallion winner and championship sire in his own right. The 1979 mare, The Cover Girl, was a National and World Champion, trained and shown by eventual Hall of Famer Jim Jirkovsky, who spent 15 years working for Eklund and helping to take his breeding program to those new heights.



Burnside's David M. How good was this "immigrant" from Argentina who proved how America had become the land of opportunity? Gene Carr had studied his record and concluded: "The team of Billy Allen and Burnside's David M. became nearly unbeatable in reining." And Jack Brainard, noted expert in just about everything: "Beyond a shadow of a doubt, Burnside's David M. is the greatest natural horse in the world. There's never been one better." Exaggerations? Let only a partial but representative record speak for itself: 1967 Open Division, NRHA Futurity, Columbus, Ohio, only Appaloosa, won first go-round, missed finals by one point; 1966 National Champion Junior Reining and World Champion Performance Horse; 1966 All American Sweepstakes, won senior reining and team tying; 1967, same show, same results. During these years, he achieved the same results in open shows and state fairs throughout Texas, New Mexico, Colorado and South Dakota. He was, as Carr concluded, a "Reining Horse Supreme."

A10

The Arab. Some may believe that this particular Q&A falls into the category of pure legend, something that has been passed down through the ages and believed, whether true or not. They are wrong. A very old story about the Peavy horses written by Chuck Schlegel provides the evidence: "In the Peavy family horse records, written in Marshall's own hand, is reference to the origins of Roberds' earlier-mentioned stud, 'The Arab,' whom Coke bred and raised. He was out of a Thoroughbred mare and by a spotted horse belonging to the Sells-Flat Circus, which was wintered in Trinidad, Colo., in the late 1800s. A great-granddaughter of this circus horse was the Old Blue Mare."


